

NM CTE State Plan 2024-2028



OCTAE has recently approved New Mexico's four-year state plan for Perkins. Some of the relevant, major changes include:

- Allows funding to be used for state-level, regional-level, AND local-level priorities (the prior plan allowed only regional priorities).
- Allows programs of study to align with careers that are in demand, high-wage, or high-skill (prior plan required all three).
- Uses a "Reserve" fund to make minimum awards of \$15,000 to all secondary LEAs (the current plan has no reserve fund; small LEAs are required to pool funding together in a consortium).
- Post-secondary allocation decreasing gradually to 35% of Perkins funds (the current plan allocates 50% of funds to PS institutions).
- Adjusted performance targets to account for HB171, changes in data collection/reporting methods, and other identified issues.

Up to 3 additional career cluster funding priorities determined by each CTE region during step 2 of the Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment process, based on regional labor market information.

LOCAL

1 career cluster funding priority determined by each LEA/HEI, based on local labor market information and community needs.



CTE Advisory Board Requirements

- Perkins V §Sec. 134(e) Consult with stakeholders on an ongoing basis to:
 - Provide input on annual updates to the comprehensive needs assessment.
 - Ensure programs of study are
 - ✓ Responsive to community employment needs.
 - ✓ Aligned with employment priorities.
 - ✓ Informed by labor market information.
 - ✓ Designed to meet current, intermediate, or long-term labor market projections.
 - ✓ Allow employer input.
 - Identify and encourage opportunities for work-based learning.
- Disability Innovation Fund Grant Project development and evaluation collaborative to support students with disabilities access to career-connected learning and transition into the workforce




The NSP is a personal, written **plan** that is developed by each student at the end of grades 8–11 and during the senior year (grade 12).

Graduation Requirements

HB 171

- 24 units
- 4 units of ELA, department approved WBL or CTE that meet academic content and performance standards
- 4 units of math, department approved WBL or CTE that meet academic content and performance standards, Algebra II must be offered not required
- 3 units in science, department approved WBL or CTE that meet academic content and performance standards
- 5.5 units in elective including a two-unit pathway concentration of student's choice (CTE, financial literacy, computer science, student service learning, languages must be offered)
- 2 units set by each district
